PREGNANCY and family support service Caroline Chisholm Society has launched a campaign to continue its operations in Moonee Valley.

The organisation wants to renovate an Essendon build-ing into its new head-quarters after it could no longer operate at its former Park St premises.

Chief executive Helen
Cooney said they needed to
raise a further \$500,000 to
turn the former mower shop
on Mt Alexander Rd into a
space fit for pregnancy and
family counselling.
"It's a dingy warehouse,
so we would like to turn it
into a welcoming environment for the organisation,"
Ms Cooney said.

"It'll allow us to serve the community that we've served for over 40 years." The organisation, which is operating out of a leased of-

fice in Shuter St, Moonee

Ponds, supports pregnant women and those with young families.

It also provides counsel-ling services and donated goods such as prams, bassi-ports and eighting. nets and clothing.

Ms Cooney said the Essendon building needed consultation rooms and an area for volunteers installed.

She said it was important
