### GROUP HELPS OVERCOME FEELINGS OF **ISOLATION**

STRUGGLING to cope with isolation and judgment, teenage mums in Melton are finding the support they need from their peers in playgroups.

Data from the Victorian Child and Adolescent Moni-toring System shows the number of teenage girls aged

number of teenage gris aged 15-19 giving birth in Melton jumped from 37 in 2007 to 54 in 2011. And last year 33 teen mums gave birth of the 900 babies born at Bacchus March and Melton Regional Hospital Hospital.

But groups like the free Caroline Chisholm Play and Learn playgroup are helping mothers and mothers to be aged 16-25 to get out of the house and support each other.

Stephanie Mumford, 20, was 18 and studying year 12 at Staughton College when she found out she was pregnant with now two-year-old son Mason.

She said she was lucky she was able to finish school and had the support of her now fiance and family.
But she said without the

playgroup she would be

stuck at home.
"Playgroup is great for both Mason and I as it gets us out of the house and socialis-

ing," Ms Mumford said. Single mum Jes Single mum Jessica McGillivray, 18, was only 15 when she fell pregnant with now two-year-old daughter Ellie.

She said from the very beginning the healthy mums and bubs group really helped her, but as Ellie got older and she moved to other groups she found some peo-

ple could be judgmental.

"The best thing about the young mums group is we are all the same, we don't feel like idiots and we learn from each other."

Alannah Nicholson, 19

agreed. She was 17 when she fell

was not only raising a child,

but watching her friends

but watching her friends walk away.
"I have great family and my partner and his family but this group has really helped us socially," she said. Caroline Chisholm So-ciety Family Support Case manager Daya Adelan said demand for groups like this

demand for groups like this was rising and the aim was to address issues of isolation for young mothers. She said assistance from

## New \$4.48m centre will boost childcare options

FAMILIES living in Melton's booming eastern corridor will soon have more

dor will soon have more childcare options available. Melton Council and the State Government have pooled their resources to fund a new \$4.48 million Burnside Children's and

The centre will provide an extra 132 kindergarten places, plus occasional care, Maternal and Child Health, parenting groups, early childhood intervention service, and playgroups.

Mayor Bob Turner said around 33 families move in and 42 babies are born in the city each week, and in Burnside a 30 per cent increase in ages 0-4 years is expected in

ages 0.4 years is expected in the next decade. "This announcement is very pleasing for our grow-ing municipality and rec-ognises the need to direct additional funds into early year's services," he said.

"It will enable the council to expand its capacity to deliver quality early learning opportunities for our youngest residents, deliver programs that reflect their interests, and encourage discovery and play.

Children and Early Child-hood Development Minister

Wendy Lovell said bringing children's services together in the one place made sense

for families.

"It is not only more convenient for families, it allows a child's progress to be better monitored, ensuring any problems can be ident-ified and addressed early on.

"This development is fan-astic news for current and future generations of children in this community.

Melton Council has com-mitted \$2.88 million to stage one of the centre. Construction is expected to be completed by the end of next



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
