Traffic and Transportation Portfolio

About the portfolio

This portfolio covers traffic management, parking, road safety and

sustainable transport.

Council maintains local roads, manages parking permits and implements around 100 traffic, road safety and parking improvements each year. We work closely with schools and community groups to spread the road safety message including a team of school crossing supervisors, a thriving Walking School Bus program and the Better Moves Around Schools program. Council also takes on the role of advocating to State Government on traffic and transport issues affecting Moonee Valley. I sit on the Integrated Transport Committee which seeks to enhance road safety and improve local walking, cycling and public transport infrastructure, as well as assisting the transportation needs of various sections of the community

Portfolio aims for Moonee Valley

Through our Integrated Transport Plan, Council aims to ensure Moonee Valley has access to safe and sustainable transport solutions that respond to the challenges of population growth, increasing congestion, rising fuel costs and the environment.

Council has had to make some hard decisions about local traffic and parking with Melbourne's growth in mind. We aim to tackle these complex issues in a fair, planned and consistent way by continually reviewing traffic and parking arrangements to ensure they are appropriate.

Through our long-term planning strategies we aim to direct higher density housing into suitable areas such as busy activity centres with good access to public transport, which will help to minimise the traffic and parking pressure in local streets. Council aims to improve road safety through building safer networks, educating promoting and enforcing road safety. We

also aim to increase the ability for residents to use sustainable transport.

Recent achievements

We have increased sustainable travel options with a new share car provider and more bicycle parking at local train stations. Cyclists are safer with the introduction of sharrow line markings in key locations, and they now have access to Victoria's first

We are nearing completion of the Buckley Park Local Area Traffic Management Study. The Walking School Bus program has 20 new volunteers, the Better Moves Around Schools program was completed at five local schools and our Fit2Drive workshops reached 450 Year 11 students.

bikes-on-buses trial.

After receiving great feedback on our draft Transport Safety Strategy, the revised version will be presented to Council for final adoption and implementation.

A new pedestrian path is planned to link the Pascoe Vale Road underpass to the Moonee Ponds Creek Trail. We will soon commence the North Essendon and Valley Lake Local Area Traffic Management Studies.

The Kent Street and Queens Avenue intersection will be modified to allow safe cycling from Pin Oak Crescent to Queens Ávenue, while a contraflow bicycle lane is set to be installed on Queens Avenue from Kent Street to Ascot Vale Road. We will also complete an off-road bicycle path that runs from Milleara Road to The Crossway South.

We will encourage young people to get walking with a range of Walk to School activities throughout October.

Lastly, I am passionate and determined to continue to advocate for an airport to city rail link, or the extension of tram route 59 to the airport as an interim measure.
