Flood warnings as wet September continues

Shepparton has almost surpassed its average monthly almost rainfall for September just half-way through the month, while some parts of the state have been hit hard by flood.

Between 11 pm Tuesday and 9 am yesterday, 13.8 mm of rain fell in Shepparton, bringing the total rainfall for the month to 36.6 mm.

The long-term average for Shepparton in September is 37.2 mm.

The Bureau of Meteorology is predicting showers for Shepparton for the rest of the week and into the weekend.

Meanwhile, people are evacuating from homes in westare ern Victoria for fear of flooding while others along the Great Ocean Road are being warned to watch out for landslides

Flooding and storm damage is widespread across the state, with the State Emergency Service receiving more than 300

calls vesterday morning The Bureau of Meteorology has issued flood warnings for several rivers across the state including major warnings for the Loddon and Wimmera

The SES has urged Victorians to remain vigilant as the Bureau of Meteorology warns of more heavy rain in coming days.

VICSES chief operations offi-cer Trevor White said it was important people continued to be aware of the risks.

"We remind people to never drive through floodwater. It only takes about 15 cm of water to lose control of your vehicle," Mi White said.

"It's important that people on the roads drive to conditions and be aware of road hazards such as mud, debris, damaged

roads and bridges.

"Also, never swim, walk or play in floodwater. It's dangerous and toxic.'

Crime spree charges

TWO MEN ARRESTED AFTER TARGETING BUSINESSES AND STEALING A CAR

Two men are expected to face a number of charges following an alleged hours-long crime spree in Cobram and across the Murray Valley early Tuesday morning.

Offenders targeted several businesses

from 2.40 am, including two hotels in Cobram, a service station in Strathmerton, a supermarket in Nathalia and a hardware store in Rochester.

The offenders allegedly ram-raided the Cobram Hotel's entrance with a grey dual-cab utility, which was earlier stolen from a Kyabram property.

Cobram police Crime Investigation Unit

Detective Senior Constable Matt Prestage said Echuca police yesterday arrested an Echuca man, 22, after he was found in a car stolen from Rochester.

Police believe the car was stolen after the offenders abandoned and set fire to another vehicle in Rochester, which was allegedly used in an earlier burglary.

The Echuca man has been charged with

offences relating to the crime spree through

Cobram, including four charges of burglary, two charges of theft of a motor vehicle and one count of arson.

The man was expected to face an out-ofsessions court hearing at Echuca vesterday afternoon.

Police then executed a search warrant at a

Tongala property and a 26-year-old Tongala man was taken into police custody, Det Sen Const Prestage said.

He was being interviewed by police yester-

day afternoon, but was expected to be charged with similar offences to the Echuca

Police recovered stolen property including cash, cigarettes, alcohol and power tools at the Tongala home.

The iPads stolen from the Cobram Hotel

are believed to have been ditched by the alleged offenders. Det Sen Const Prestage said investigations

were pending.

Police were expecting to make further arrests in relation to the crime spree.

Police were also investigating links to two

burglaries in Echuca.

Simple, safe idea for new mums

An innovative Scandinavian baby box design has been launched in Shepparton. Springtime expectant mothers will receive

a free baby box thanks to the Caroline Chisholm Society, known as 'Preg Support'.
Society chief executive Helen Cooney said

any new mother was eligible to receive the boxes which are also filled with a gift pack and double as a bed with an internal mat-

"We believe this simple, safe and supportive idea is right for us in Shepparton, said

"We love its simplicity — it's a box that's recyclable and can become a toy box.

"We love its safety — it's a great way to encourage safe sleeping practices.

"We love its model of support — it's a way to engage with families to prevent social isolation, family violence, the impacts of homelessness and engagement with child protection."

The boxes were launched at a recently held open day by the society, also known as Goulburn Valley Pregnancy and Support Services, where it also launched a new 'Friends' group.

Goulburn Valley collaboration co-ordinator Belinda Guilmartin gave out the first boxes and will co-design a parenting survey with

local mums into the future.

According to the society, a total of 250 baby boxes will soon be available for new and expectant mothers

Ms Cooney said the society would also hold a local design competition for the boxes, currently covered in owls, so that the boxes were unique to Shepparton.

"The most exciting thing for the community is that they can get involved," Ms Cooney

Lead practitioner Aneta Moody said other options for support within the society included parenting groups, increasing kin-dergarten support work and volunteer

mentoring.
"But the message from our clients, volunteers and colleagues was clear — using the baby box as a tool would help us to avoid baby box as a tool would neight is to avoid duplication, to work together and to provide information at the time families prepare for parenting," she said.
